Background and overview

This is a report of an Australian Psychology Accreditation Council (APAC) initial (out-of-cycle) accreditation assessment following a submission by RMIT University (RMIT) for the accreditation of the Level 1 Graduate Diploma in Psychology (Campus: Online) bridging program. This assessment is in the form of an on-paper assessment based solely on the *Submission for accreditation*.

APAC last reviewed RMIT's psychology programs in 2017, at which time the programs offered at the Melbourne campus were accredited with conditions for a shortened period as a small number of shortfalls were identified against the Accreditation Standards. Subsequent to the review, all outstanding conditions were satisfied, and RMIT's range of psychology programs have since been accredited without conditions.

The Level 1 Graduate Diploma bridging program has been designed to be offered in partnership with RMIT Online. It provides students with previous qualifications in a different discipline an opportunity to acquire the *Foundational Competencies* to progress towards registration as a psychologist in Australia.

Key findings

The proposed program is to be taught and delivered 100% online in partnership with RMIT Online. The Discipline of Psychology has developed and will govern, oversee and manage the curriculum and content of the program, combined with RMIT Online's expertise in delivering online learning via its specific and well-designed learning platforms.

The Level 1 Bridging programs comprises 10 units of study, for which eight units are considered as part of the required sequence, providing graduates with the foundational and rudimentary understanding and knowledge of the psychology discipline, and allowing achievement of the required graduate competencies enabling graduates to apply for entry into a Level 2 Honours or Graduate Diploma program.

The curriculum appears to cover most of the Level 1 *Foundational Competencies* adequately, and the Discipline is commended for its integration of content regarding cultural responsiveness, including Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples.

Based on the program's proposed plans, policies, procedures and responses to the Standards, the program is expected to meet the *Accreditation Standards*. However, as some evidence is not yet available for review, further information and evidence are required before these criteria can be considered as met.



APAC Board determination

That RMIT University's **Graduate Diploma in Psychology** (Level 1) (Campus: Online) program is accredited from **1 January 2021** until **31 December 2022** subject to the following conditions:

By **31 January 2022**:

1. To ensure that Standard 3 Program of study, criterion 3.2 and Standard 5 Assessment, criteria 5.1 and 5.2 are met, the Discipline is to provide evidence demonstrating that *Foundational Competency 1.5* is clearly embedded, taught, and appropriately assessed as a required learning outcome throughout the program.
2. To ensure that Standard 5 Assessment, criterion 5.3 is met, the Discipline is to provide a variety of de-identified student work samples, including evidence that multiple assessment tools are utilised, for the units offered in its first semester.

As monitoring requirements, by **31 January 2022** the Discipline is to provide evidence of:

- i. how synchronous activities are delivered
- ii. how breaches of professional and ethical conduct and policies and/or guidelines are managed.
